Sunday morning just after the snowstorm passed, one of the three transformers feeding the City failed. Crews were called out and load was restored in less than 1.5 hours. Engineering arrived at 3 a.m. to assist in Delmarva's efforts to get the 138kV feed to the faulty transformer back on. Without energizing the transformer, the feed was restored by ensuring a series of interlocks were reset as they had tripped during the fault. The next day a 34kV transformer bushing was found to have failed and was most likely exacerbated by the large build up of ice around the bushing. Complete testing was done on the transformer to ensure the bushing was the only problem. A new bushing is on order and will take up to eight (8) weeks to get.

The line crews are pulling new conductors along Chapel Street in order to tie into the substation new transformer that will be installed at the East Main Substation sometime this summer. A bigger 12kV unit will retire the City's oldest 4kV transformer and is being built in Virginia in the next few months.

The electricians worked on a 34kV breaker that feeds the substation transformer that tripped off last week because of a defective pressure valve. It was found because the transformer was off and, consequently, it's heaters deenergized the grease that keeps the breaker operating properly was not flexible enough on the coldest days. A heavy weight oil is now lubricating the properly functioning breaker.

The line crews are keeping up with the construction projects of Chimney Ridge and Alder Creek this week.

The electricians also worked on the Downes Elementary School flashing lights, maintenance on receptacles at the Police Station, and heating issues at the Wilson Center.

Engineering worked on the defective differential relay found during last week's outage. The old relay will be replaced along with the pressure valve. Engineering also continued working on the railroad crossing permit mention last week.

Our two newest police recruits, Michael Hatton and Andrew Vari, began working at the department on February 23rd. They join the three recruits who previously began work a few weeks ago. All five recruits will begin training at the Delaware State Police Academy on March 9th, with an expected graduation date in August.

Earlier this month, Officer Taras Gerasimov while on patrol located a stolen vehicle in one of our hotels. As a result of information gained from this vehicle, the Elkton Maryland Police Department, was able to obtain an arrest warrant in regard to a violent home invasion that occurred in their jurisdiction.

Deputy Chief Feeney and Lieutenant VanCampen have plans in place for Saint Patrick's Day activities. Typically our busiest day, is the Saturday before the holiday. Extra officers will be working, and we have coordinated with the City Code Enforcement Division and the University of Delaware Police Department.

Lt. Hargrove was recently assigned to Professional Standards and serves as the department's Public Information Officer. On Thursday and Friday, Lt. Hargrove will be attending a two-day PIO course sponsored by DEMA.

On February 25th, at 12:15 a.m., officers responded to Newark Parking Lot 1, on a report of a domestic dispute. Prior to arrival, offices were notified by dispatch that the two individuals involved in the dispute had entered a black Nissan. The driver of the vehicle broke off the arm of the exit gate and fled the lot. A few minutes later Corporal Marsilii observed a vehicle matching that description, make an illegal u-turn and driving at a high rate of speed. Upon stopping the vehicle, the driver exited and became confrontational with Cpl. Marsilii. The driver told the officer that he probably should not be driving due to his consumption of alcohol and the fact that he does not have a driver's license. The driver was taken into custody and charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, theft of service, driving while license was suspended or revoked, failure to have required insurance and several other motor vehicle violations. Judging Criteria

Nominees will be judged based on collective benefit and impact, including criteria in the following categories:

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The University of Delaware lost approximately 21,000 gallons of chilled water from its central loop. We have determined that more than 20,000 gallons was discharged into the sanitary sewer at the East Campus Utility Plant due to operational problems and less than 500 gallons of chilled water was discharged to the storm water sewer due a cracked pipe in an air handling unit in Purnell Hall. Both losses have been corrected.

The chilled water is treated with a corrosion inhibitor (Corshield NT402) and a fluorescent green tracing dye. The concentration of the corrosion inhibitor in the chilled water loop is maintained at about 100 ppm.

DNREC took over the official response for this spill immediately because UD contacted them as soon as they were aware of the break.

The dye is used for flow tracing in waterways as well.

Solicitors Update on the Rockmoss property:

- What has been accomplished

Once it came to light that 919 Rockmoss needed to be condemned because of raw sewage accumulating in the basement, and the serious resulting structural issues, access to enter the home was blocked. At the same time, considerable effort was expended in ascertaining the current owners of this property. For many years, the property was titled in the name of a Trust. When the trust beneficiary died without a will about 2 years ago, the title to the property was determined by the document that created the Trust. Unfortunately the persons or entities named in the Trust agreement had no idea they might have an interest in the property. And when we contacted them, and advised them of the present condition of the property, and the amount of unpaid City and County taxes/liens thereon, all potential owners advised in writing that they were disclaiming any interest in the property.

- What we are working on accomplishing now

The next step is for the City to file a tax monition action. The last monition action filed by the City was many years ago. The procedure for this is set forth in Newark's Charter. Unfortunately, the provisions are outdated, and are not in step with the County Tax Motion regulations. For instance with the County Monition action, there is a 3 month period of redemption after the sale, whereas with a Newark monition action, there is a one year period of redemption. So if a property is sold pursuant to a Newark Monition action, the winning bidder (most likely the City) would have to wait 1 year to allow potential owners to redeem their interest and pay off all taxes. Mainly because the one year period of redemption was so onerous, your previous Solicitor, Roger Akin, recommended the City amend the Monition provisions in the Charter so they echoed the County's regulations. In order to avoid the one year wait for the distressed (and smelly) property, the City did reach out to the County to see if it would be willing to file a monition action for County taxes. The County declined this request.

- Next Steps

Time table for acquiring title: Assuming all goes smoothly, after filing the Monition Complaint, I would anticipate a sale date in 4-6 months, and, because of the 1 year redemption period, we should have a sheriff's deed to the property in 16 -18 months

1. I have already requested and received an updated lien search for Rockmoss property.
2. I will require a current statement of all past due taxes/loans/charges for this property. I recently received updated maintenance cost figures from Mr. Wilson (attached). I still require updated tax/loan statements etc.
3. Once I have statements for all past due taxes/liens, the next step is to prepare and file Monition Pleadings in the Superior Court.
4. Once filed, I would then send a Notice of the filing to all possible owners/lienholders of record via certified mail, and also have notice posted on property. The owners/lienholders would include those persons/entities named in the Trust Agreement.
5. Once that is accomplished, I would then file an affidavit with the court stating that the Notices were sent and the property was posted.

6. Assuming no response to the filing, I would then file for a writ instructing the sheriff to conduct the sale.
7. Once scheduled, I would request an updated lien search, and then I would send another Notice – this time advising possible owners/lienholders of the sale date.
8. I would then file another affidavit advising that this second notice was sent.
9. Attend the sale, and bid City's interest in the property. (I will require bidding instructions from Staff)
10. Assuming we are the high bidder, after waiting a year post sale, I would file a Petition advising of no redemption, and requesting the sheriff be directed to issue a deed to the City.

Per the following opinion of Mr. Herron, no council action is required:

"In my view the filing of a monitions action does not require Council authorization/approval. The relevant Charter provision is contained within Article V "Property and Special Assessments", not Article IV "Powers of Council." Attempts to enforce collection of taxes or assessments, which includes the decision on whether to file a monitions action, is an operational rather than a legislative function. The Charter does state that Council, once title is acquired, is "authorized and empowered...by resolution duly adopted" to sell and convey any real estate purchased through the monitions process but there is no reference to Council action as a prerequisite to the filing of such an action.
