# **Electric Department**

#### **Notable Notes:**

The line crews and engineering are preparing for an early morning shutdown of several businesses and residences at Delaware Avenue and Chapel Street next week. The short outage (most customers less than 1/2 hour) will happen between 5:00 and 6:30 a.m. Monday morning in order to move the customers onto a newly pulled circuit. Thorough planning and coordination are needed for uneventful execution.

Engineering and a line crew troubleshot a switched capacitor bank that had failed many weeks ago and was put out of service. The polemounted capacitor bank was found to have two out of three switches faulty and these have been removed for future replacement. Because the controller was previously diagnosed as broken and now two switches are determined to be defective, lightning or another kind of surge is the suspected cause.

The electricians installed arc flash labels on padmount transformers. The labels comply with the new OSHA requirements and specify what level of personal protection is necessary for working on or around open energized equipment. The electricians also worked installing circuits and receptacles for IT and have been doing metering jobs while the meter technician is out for surgery.

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# **Police Department**

### **Notable Notes:**

On March 22<sup>nd</sup>, at 12:38 a.m., Corporal Saunders and Officer Olicker responded to the 200 block of East Main Street on a report of subjects breaking car windows with a baseball bat. The officers arrived and observed two males breaking car windows. One suspect was arrested and the second suspect attempted to flee in his vehicle. The suspect backed his car up toward Officer Olicker, forcing the officer to jump out of the way. The suspect then drove forward toward Officer Olicker, once again forcing the officer to jump out of the path of the vehicle to avoid being struck. The driver sped off and was apprehended a short distance away. The suspect expressed suicidal thoughts and made statement about "suicide by cop". Suicide by cop is when a person wishes to die and places themselves in a deadly situation with a police officer, forcing the officer to take the suspect's life. The suspect was charged with driving under the influence as well as numerous criminal charges.

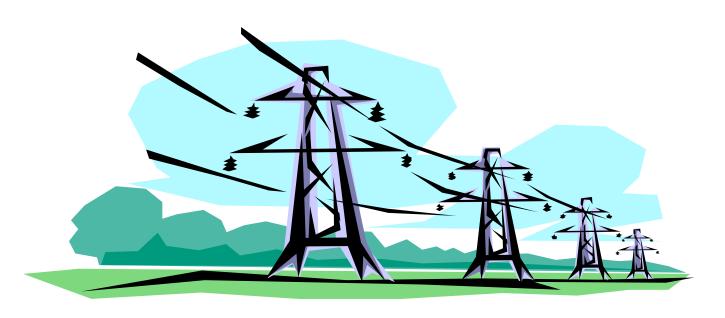
In the early morning hours of March 23<sup>rd</sup>, officers responded to a report of a motor vehicle crashing into a tree on South College Avenue. The driver of the vehicle was found to have suffered injuries to his leg and the passenger was found to be unresponsive. Officers removed the passenger from the vehicle and began CPR. Aetna Fire Company and NCCEMS arrived at the scene and also tried to revive the patient. These efforts were not successful and the passenger was pronounced dead at Christiana Hospital. Unfortunately this is the six fatality in the city, in approximately the past two years, related to driving under the influence of alcohol. Officers have been directed to increase their vigilance regarding detecting motorist driving under the influence.

On March 23<sup>rd</sup>, Lieutenant VanCampen was invited by Aetna Fire Chief A.J. Schall to attend a meeting that evening with area fire companies and Norfolk Southern Railroad concerning railroad safety and crude oil incidents.

On March 26<sup>th</sup>, Chief Tiernan, Deputy Chief Feeney, and a PW&WR member, attended a four-hour New Castle County Recovery Workshop. The purpose of the workshop was to discuss the roles, responsibilities, and capabilities of the county and municipalities, regarding recovery operations in the wake of a major weather event in New Castle County.
