At 1:30 a.m., April 15, the standby crews were called out for a power outage. They found a substation transformer had tripped off and that a microprocessor relay that had caused the outage was locked up. Engineering was called and the two distribution circuits that originated from the transformer were switched to other transformers. Several businesses, apartments, and University buildings were off for about two hours. The seven-year-old relay was replaced and the manufacturer contacted. The transformer was already scheduled to be switched off that day in preparation for a contractor to test the transformer as part of preventative maintenance. This testing would not have found the relay problem and after the power was cycled off/on the defective relay appeared normal again.

The line crews continued working back to the East Main Substation with the new 12kV circuit construction. A changeover from 4kV to 12kV was done Tuesday morning to the residents around the Tyre Avenue area with another scheduled for Saturday to the residents on Independence Circle.

The electricians changed a battery charger on a substation transformer, ran new communications wiring to

the police HVAC controller, fixed a sump pump alarm at the Municipal Building, and worked on a pump at the water plant.

The group handled 611 phone calls the week of 4/6/15 (223 of which were for the sole purpose of processing a payment) with an average call length of 3:43 and an average hold & queue time (average speed of answer) of 4:58. The group also processed a total of 4,292 utility payments and CityView transactions while the Welcome Center processed 324 visitors. 288 service calls were initiated by Payments and Utility Billing in response to the calls and visitors. The Finance Department's customary statistics, in addition to new data available with the VOIP technology, are being maintained on a weekly basis in 2015 to develop key performance indicators.

The accounting team continues to work on the year-end financial statements and related work in connection with the annual audit; see additional information reported in the Independent Financial Audit project detail.

We have also begun preparing for the 2016 budget process by reviewing summer vacation schedules, identifying potential workshop and public hearing dates, drafting a budget calendar, and revising Budget Central on the City's website to house a repository for 2016 budget process updates. Items will be posted to 2016 Budget Central as it becomes available.

We held a bid opening for Contract No. 15-03, Renovations of Ten (10) Tennis Court Areas. Three (3) contractors submitted bids. We'll spend time reviewing and evaluating the bids and prepare a recommendation of award to the City Manager, Mayor and Council.

We conducted a very successful Spring Community Clean up last Saturday. 175 volunteers committed more than 374 total volunteer hours collecting 6,000 pounds of trash and debris. A large amount of the heavier trash and debris was collected from behind the townhouses located on Madison Drive. This year's clean up focused mainly along public roadways. Recreation Supervisor Bruen did a great job organizing the event.

Park Superintendent Zaleski committed time working on a landscape/hardscape plan for the area next to the Old Train Station/Newark History Museum under the South College Avenue bridge.

The Park Superintendent and Park Supervisor sat in on interviews to attempt to fill vacant seasonal maintenance positions.

The maintenance crew committed time at the Community Garden site turning over soil to remove rocks and debris as we continue to prepare the site for gardeners.

Recreation staff continues to plan for the summer season. They are currently interviewing to fill camp counselor positions and planning training and orientation sessions.

We received our new "temporary" pump for Arbour Park this week which will serve as our backup once the new booster station is constructed. We had a pump failure over the winter and have been battling low pressure ever since. The new pump didn't provide the pressures we expected, and we were able to determine from the pressure differential that we had a main break somewhere in Arbour Park where water was not coming to the surface, a very uncommon occurrence. We found the break and were able to repair it on Wednesday. Pressures are now where we expected.

We are working with American Public Works Association (APWA) to schedule a series of trench safety training classes for our employees and others in the state that may want to attend. Training will be held at the City Maintenance Yard and it looks like it will be held in June or July of this year.
