Parks and Recreation Department

Recreation Supervisor of Athletics confirmed the bus trips for the week for the summer camps. She also sent out information to camp participants on Rittenhouse Family Fun Day scheduled for August 1 and the first day letters for session III starting July 13.

Recreation Supervisor of Athletics continues to submit background check forms as they are received to the state for checks prior to camps being held. The results are slowly coming back.

Recreation Supervisor of Athletics checked Rittenhouse Camp throughout the week and helped with the transfer to the rain location due to inclement weather. She helped coordinate the change in rain location for July 3 to the Wilson Center since the schools were not open due to the holiday weekend.

Camps held at the George Wilson Center this week included Camp GWC and Before & After Care, and Bricks 4 Kidz Mining and Crafting. Camp GWC enjoyed a trip to Launch Trampoline Park on Wednesday.

The Recreation Supervisor of Community Events prepared for and held the 4<sup>th</sup> of July festivities, including the Fireworks and Liberty Day. She finalized the logistics for the event including the removal of the throwing cage nets, delivery of the lights, canopy, and portable toilets, coordinating with DelDOT and NPD on traffic control needs, and working with UD on items related to their property. Approximately 30,000-35,000 people were in attendance in the area of the UD Athletic Complex for the Liberty Day activities and the Fireworks. DelDOT, NPD and UDPD did an outstanding job controlling traffic and mitigating traffic away from the area following the event.

Camp R.E.A.L is going well at Dickey Park. The number of campers varies from day to day, but are still consistent at 15-25. There are 40 enrolled in camp. Last week was America Week. Games and activities centered around patriotism. We had to cancel on Thursday because of inclement weather and were very happy to have Mayor Sierer volunteer on Wednesday.

The Recreation Supervisor of Community Events has also been planning the schedule, activities and guests for the new SAFE KIDS CAMP, which is scheduled for the week of July 27-31. She has been scheduling guest speakers and working with the instructor to set the final schedule.

The Newark Community Garden Ribbon Cutting Ceremony held on Tuesday, June 30, 2015 was a great success! Community Garden Committee Members, Members of City Council, City Manager Carol Houck, Mayor Polly Sierer, Parks and Recreation Director, Recreation Superintendent, Parks Superintendent, Parks Supervisor, Recreation Specialist, Eagle Scout Alan Buckmaster's parents, Networks School Volunteer leaders and more were all in attendance for the event. The <a href="Newark Post">Newark Post</a> reported perfectly "It's only just beginning to produce vegetables, but Newark's community garden has already lived up to its name, bringing together several individuals and groups for a common purpose."

The Recreation Supervisor and Recreation Specialist met with Eagle Scout Nic Krusko at Leroy C. Hill Park on Wednesday, July 1 to review the project. Visitor and Home Side Bullpens have been built, filled in with Diamond Tech dirt, and have had the necessary hardware installed (new home plates/pitching rubbers). The fences have been moved and new ones where necessary have been made behind the pitching mound and home plate areas. Between the pitching mounds and the fence, a 2-3 foot area of mulch has been added and boxed in to limit the chances of injury and provide additional space for the pitchers to extend

their arms. The mounds are fully functional and can be used during both games and practices. The scorers' table has also been sanded down and stained, the sides of the dugouts have been water sealed, wooden areas around home plate have been repainted, and mulch has been spread around various areas of the field. Attached are photos of the finished project.

Total volunteer hours for the week of June 29-July 4 are 375 Hours.

Parks staff continued cleaning up downed/damaged trees/shrubs throughout park system, loaded for Liberty Day event including working on the day of the event, continued mowing operations, dragged/scarified ball fields, sprayed round up as needed, and did equipment maintenance on mowing equipment.

Horticulture staff continued on bed maintenance, mulching, assisted with Liberty Day loading and clean up, sprayed round up as needed, and did interior bed maintenance as needed at City Hall.

Contractor completed work on the tennis courts at Phillips Park, and started working on courts at Handloff Park.

YBC crew did trash sweeps at City Hall and several park sites daily, did graffiti removal at Ground Round island, assisted with tree clean up at many sites, and assisted full-time staff at Community Garden site (weeding/grading/seeding), and did trail maintenance along the Hall Trail.

ORDINANCE NO.	
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## ORDINANCE REGULATING THE POSSESSION OF FIREARMS, AMMUNITION, COMPONENTS OF FIREARMS, AND EXPLOSIVES IN MUNICIPAL BUILDINGS AND POLICE STATIONS IN THE CITY/TOWN OF \_\_\_\_\_.

WHEREAS, by and through adoption of House Bill 192 by the 148<sup>th</sup> General Assembly of the State of Delaware ("HB192"), codified at Title 22, Section 111 of the Delaware Code, municipalities are permitted to adopt Ordinances regulating the possession of firearms, ammunition, components of firearms, or explosives in municipal buildings and police stations.

WHEREAS, The Mayor and City/Town Council desire to add a new Section 1.1 of the City/Town Code to prohibit possession of firearms, ammunition, components of firearms, or explosives in municipal buildings and police stations to the fullest extent permitted by HB 192;

WHEREAS, The City/Town of \_\_\_\_\_ has introduced this Ordinance in accordance with procedures established by law.

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED, by the City/Town of that the following Code changes and revisions are adopted:

**Section 1.** Amend/Add Section 1.1 of the City/Town Code to add the following language:

Section 1.1 - Possession Of Firearms, Ammunition, Components Of Firearms, Or Explosives In Municipal Buildings And Police Stations Prohibited.

- (a) <u>Prohibition.</u> Except as set forth in section (e) below, possession of firearms, ammunition, components of firearms, or explosives in municipal buildings and police stations is prohibited in all municipal buildings and police stations.
- (b) <u>Municipal Building Defined.</u> For purposes of this section, "municipal buildings" are defined as any building where the <u>City/Town</u> meets in its official capacity, or any building containing the offices of elected officials and of public employees actively engaged in performing governmental business, but excludes any

parking facility. The definition of "municipal building" also includes any non-City/Town owned or leased building where the City/Town is meeting in or occupying such a building, but only during the time that the City/Town is meeting in or occupying such a building.

- (c) <u>Required Signs.</u> In all municipal buildings and police stations, a conspicuous sign shall be posted at each entrance stating that the possession of firearms, ammunition, components of firearms, or explosives are prohibited. Such sign may but is not required to also state that persons in violation may be denied entrance to the building or be ordered to leave the building.
- (d) <u>Immediate Departure</u>. Any person who immediately foregoes entry or immediately exits any municipal building or police station due to the possession of a firearm, ammunition, components of firearms, or explosives shall not be guilty of violating this section.
- (e) <u>Exemptions</u>. Nothing in this <u>section 1.1</u> shall be deemed to prevent the following in municipal buildings or police stations:
  - (1) Possession of firearms, components of firearms, and ammunition or explosives by law enforcement officers;
  - (2) Law enforcement agencies receiving shipments or delivery of firearms, components of firearms, ammunition, or explosives;
  - (3) Law enforcement agencies conducting firearms safety and training programs;
  - (4) Law enforcement agencies conducting firearm or ammunition public safety programs, donation, amnesty, or any other similar programs in police stations or municipal buildings;
  - (5) Compliance by persons subject to protection from abuse court orders;

- (6) Carrying firearms and ammunition by persons who hold a valid license pursuant to either §1441 or §1441A of Title 11 of the Delaware Code so long as the firearm remains concealed except for inadvertent display or for self defense or defense of others;
- (7) Carrying firearms and ammunition by officers or employees of the United States duly authorized to carry a concealed firearm; or
- (8) Carrying firearms and ammunition by agents, messengers and other employees of common carriers, banks, or business firms, whose duties require them to protect moneys, valuables and other property and are engaged in the lawful execution of such duties.
- (f) <u>Penalties</u>. As necessary to protect public safety, any intentional violation of this <u>section 1.1</u> by any person shall be subject to a fine of at least \_\_\_\_\_ and not to exceed \_\_\_\_\_, or by imprisonment for not more than \_\_\_\_\_, or by both fine and imprisonment.

**Section 2. Severability**. The provisions of this Ordinance shall be severable. If any provisions of this Ordinance are found by any court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or void, the remaining provisions of this Ordinance shall remain valid, unless the court finds that the valid provisions of this Ordinance are so essentially and inseparably connected with, and so dependent upon, the unconstitutional or void provision that it cannot be presumed that City/Town Council would have enacted the remaining valid provisions without the unconstitutional or void provision; or unless the court finds that the remaining valid provisions, standing alone, are incomplete and incapable of being executed in accordance with City/Town Council's intent. To the extent that this Ordinance is deemed to exceed the statutory authorization provided by HB 192, the City/Town Council's intent is to implement the provisions of HB 192 to the fullest extent permitted, and the Ordinance should be interpreted so that any invalid provision is limited only to the maximum authorization permitted by HB 192.

Section 3. No Repeal Of Existing Firearms Related Ordinances. Adoption of this Ordinance shall in no way repeal or alter any law, ordinance or regulation prohibiting, restricting or licensing the ownership, transfer, possession or

transportation of firearms or ammunition enacted before July 4, 1985. To the extent that this Ordinance conflicts with any similar ordinance prohibiting, restricting or licensing the ownership, transfer, possession or transportation of firearms or ammunition enacted before July 4, 1985, the more stringent of the two ordinances shall govern.

**Section 4. Effective Date**. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its adoption by City/Town Council.
