Senator Poore and Mayor Green from Delaware City expressed concerns regarding noise associated with an outdoor range, so we will be holding off on moving forward with an outdoor range in this location at this time. We will continue to investigate other potential locations, configurations, and partnership opportunities. The line crews replaced a Verizon pole on Windsor Drive after a tree fell on the communication lines and overstressed the pole. Unfortunately, when Verizon was notified of the problem late last week nothing was done until the pole snapped this week.

There were two failed primary underground cables this weekend that will require a contractor to bore in new. Saturday at 8 p.m. the crews responded to a cable failure on Country Club Drive and Sunday afternoon they found a bad cable on Ethan Allen Court in Cherry Hill Manor. In both instances, the underground cables were isolated and alternate feeds were used to restore power.

On Friday afternoon, the Brookdale White Chapel assisted living complex lost power for an hour when a squirrel blew a fuse.

The line crews continued working at Preston's Playground moving and installing gym equipment. The line crews also pulled out primary cables under Chestnut Hill Road at Rt. 72 and are getting prepared to pull in bigger cables for a capacity upgrade.

The electricians have been busy at the garage installing high bay lights, turning on the caution lights at the schools, and working on police camera issues.

Engineering is getting prices for the bore jobs, worked on integrating GIS with the engineering software, and met with contractors and developers on various project, e.g. Chemours, Enterprise, and Martin Honda.

Tax bills are due September 30th. All tax bills can now be viewed directly online at https://newarkde.gov/taxbill.

On Tuesday September 4th, the City launched a new process for customers to pay their utility bills via phone. Credit card and e-check payments by phone for utility bills are now only accepted via Paymentus. Utilizing Paymentus' platform, credit cards and banking information is secure and PCI compliant. Callers now can bypass PUB directly when they call in to make a payment, and will no longer need to sit in the phone cue. Since we process about 1,100 utility payments each month over the phone, this should decrease (over time) hold times to talk to a customer service representative. As of now, there is no charge being passed along to the customer. Over two days, Paymentus processed 128 payments on behalf of the City. Once the City's software is updated in 2019, we will move forward with utilizing Paymentus for online payments via CustomerConnect and the processing of walk-in customers.

Automatic Bill Payment/Leak Detection System - CustomerConnect

Description:

We would like to remind all residents that monthly utility bills can be processed automatically via CustomerConnect. Did you know that CustomerConnect also has features that will alert you when your household exceeds certain consumption thresholds? This tool is helpful for finding water leaks, or unintended electric usage before it goes on for a prolonged period of time, saving you money. The notification thresholds can be set by the account holder on a monthly, weekly or daily limit. It's another way of keeping utility consumption to a minimum. The account holder can elect to be notified by email, text, and via notice to their web portal account.

Newark utility customers also have the option to pay the City for utility services using CustomerConnect's "Budget Billing" option. This method of payment allows the account holder to pay a fixed amount each month on the date of their choosing when they sign up for this feature. The system determines your estimated annual utility bill and divides that amount by twelve months. On the December bill, there will be a true up for whatever balance that remains (either a credit or debit to the account) to settle the balance for the year.

CODE ENFORCEMENT:

Property Maintenance reported moderate activity this past weekend. Weekend patrol is ongoing, with an emphasis on trash and debris, high grass, and miscellaneous inspections on complaints within units. Construction is underway on Benny Street for the new townhome development. The tenant fit-out for Dominos and Drip Café at 60 North College Avenue is continuing. The next level of façade replacement at the Washington House for the stone veneer is ongoing. The renovation work for the Food Lion at Fairfield Shopping Center is ongoing; construction for the overall renovation of the shopping center is continuing. Façade renovations at College Square Shopping Center are ongoing. The framing on South Main Street for the next phase of Chimney Ridge is continuing. Plans are under review for the new Millcroft Memory Care Facility building. Staff continued to meet and discuss projects with University of Delaware staff. These meetings are with UD personnel, as well as with the general contractors at the various projects, to discuss progress and issues.

Construction of the new rail station on the STAR Campus is continuing. The structural steel installation is ongoing for the new six-story lab at the site; the façade work should begin in the near future. The Chemours Building structural steel is being installed, as well as the exterior walls. The tenant fit-outs for the top floors of the new STAR building are under review.

Code Enforcement continues to correct issues with the data on business and rental licenses and met with the City Solicitor to discuss the collection process for delinquent notices as outlined in City Code.

PARKING:

City of Newark municipal parking in lots and at meters was offered at no charge on Monday in observance of Labor Day. Meters were programmed prior to the holiday and signage was created and affixed to all parking equipment and payment stations. Regular parking rates resumed on Tuesday. The entrance into Lot 3 was closed on Tuesday to reconstruct a water catch-basin that had slowly deteriorated over time.

Parking Manager Marvin Howard met with Public Works staff regarding the Center Street replacement project. Parking management attended a meeting on Wednesday to discuss proposed plans for adding parking in Lot 1, where the City of Newark is acquiring property from the University of Delaware. Interviews were conducted for the open Parking Attendant position and applicants were identified for interviews for the open part-time Parking Ambassador position. Historical residential parking permit input was concluded for the Residential Parking Program. The Division is now working on a new "spot-check" system that will allow Parking Ambassadors to ensure proper residential guest pass usage across all zones. August 2018 Financials were completed.

PLANNING/LAND USE:

At its meeting on September 4, the Planning Commission took the following actions:

- Recommended approval of the annexation, rezoning, and major subdivision with site plan approval of the property located at 0 Paper Mill Road
- Discussed a potential rezoning and Comprehensive Development Plan amendment for Focus Area 5 South Chapel Street

The Community Development/Revenue Sharing Advisory Committee will meet on Wednesday, September 12, at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chamber. The Committee will begin the initial review of applications received for the 45th CDBG program and the 2019 Revenue Sharing Program.

Planner Mike Fortner and Director Gray met with the consultant AECOM to discuss the public outreach effort at Community Day set for Sunday, September 16. On Tuesday, Mike presented the Planning Commission with a revised draft of potential Comprehensive Development Plan amendments and changes to the Zoning Code in the South Chapel Street area.

LAND USE PROJECTS CURRENTLY UNDER REVIEW:

1119 South College Avenue, Parcel 1804600026 (PR#16-06-01): On June 6, 2016, the Planning and Development Department received a sketch plan review for the proposed redevelopment of the property at 1119 South College Avenue, the present location of the Red Roof Inn. The application and plans for the proposed major subdivision and special use permit were received on November 20, 2016. Revised plans were received February 8, 2017. The proposal calls for demolition of the existing structure at the site and construction of a 4-story hotel and convenience store with gas pumps, with associated parking. Staff comments were sent to the applicant on March 9, 2017.

0 Independence Way, Village of Chestnut Hill, Parcel ID 1100900078 (PR#16-06-02): The Planning and Development Department received plans for an annexation, rezoning, and major subdivision of the property located at 0 Independence Way on June 30, 2016. The plans call for a 45-unit townhouse community at the site. Plans were reviewed by the Subdivision Advisory Committee (SAC) at an October 13, 2017 meeting. SAC comments were sent to the applicant on October 27, 2017.

65 South Chapel Street, Continental Court Apartments, Parcel ID 1802000209 (PR#17-04-03): The Planning and Development Department received a sketch plan review for the proposed redevelopment of the property at 65 South Chapel Street on April 19, 2017. The proposal calls for the demolition of the existing apartment building and construction of a 74-unit, 5-story high-rise apartment building at the site. The sketch plan has been pulled by the applicant, who plans to submit a revised plan in the future.

92 East Main Street, Parcel ID 1802000033 (PR#17-09-01): The Planning and Development Department received plans for a major subdivision, special use permit, and parking waiver for the property located at 92 East Main Street on September 7, 2017. The plans call for a mixed-use building with commercial space on the ground floor and 15 apartments on the second, third and

fourth floors. The proposal appears to remove seven parking spaces from Municipal Lot 3, but includes transfer of the remaining parking lot to City of Newark ownership. The proposal was reviewed by the Downtown Newark Partnership Design Committee on October 3, 2017. Plans were reviewed by the Subdivision Advisory Committee (SAC) on October 10, 2017. SAC comments were sent to the applicant on October 20, 2017.

0 Paper Mill Road, Parcel ID 0805200012 (PR#17-11-01): On November 7, 2017, the Planning and Development Department received plans for the annexation, rezoning from NCC-SR New Castle County zoning to RS (single family residential) City of Newark zoning, and major subdivision with site plan approval for the property located at 0 Paper Mill Road. The proposal includes the creation of 18 new lots for construction of single family homes. Plans were distributed to the Subdivision Advisory Committee (SAC) on November 7, 2017. A SAC meeting was held on December 6, 2017. SAC comments were sent to the applicant on December 14, 2017. Revised plans were submitted on April 2, 2018 and distributed to the Subdivision Advisory Committee for review. A SAC meeting was held May 29, 2018 to discuss the plans with City operating departments. Staff comments were sent to the applicant on June 1, 2018. Revised plans were received by the Planning and Development Department on August 17, 2018. SAC comments were sent to the applicant on August 28, 2018. At their meeting on September 4, 2018, the Planning Commission recommended approval of the annexation, rezoning, and major subdivision with site plan approval. The project will be placed on an upcoming City Council agenda.

67-69 New London Avenue, Parcel ID 1801900262 (PR#17-11-02): The Planning and Development Department received plans for a minor subdivision for the property located at 67-69 New London Avenue on November 15, 2017. The proposal includes the demolition of the existing building on the site and the construction of two townhouses. Plans were distributed to the Subdivision Advisory Committee (SAC) on November 15, 2017. A SAC meeting was held February 14, 2018. SAC comments were sent to the applicant on March 12, 2018. Revised plans were received by the Planning and Development Department on May 18, 2018 and distributed for SAC review. Revised plans were received by the Planning and Development Department on June 7, 2018. On August 16, the applicant appeared before the Board of Adjustment. The Board heard the applicant's appeal for a variance regarding the Planning Department's definition of dwelling, multi-family per Section 32-4(a)(40) for the property at 67-69 New London Road, which was denied. The Board also denied the appeal regarding the interpretation of Section 32-11(b)(1) regarding the conversation of a one-family dwelling unit for two or more families. The Board voted to table discussion of the remaining area variances at this time. The Planning and Development Department received revised plans on August 29, 2018.

46 Welsh Tract Road, Parcel IDs 1100900033, 1100900059 (PR#17-11-03): On November 16, 2017, the Planning and Development Department received a sketch plan for the annexation, rezoning from S (Suburban) New Castle County zoning to RR (Town Houses) City of Newark zoning, and major subdivision, with possible site plan approval, of two parcels totaling 2.15 acres to construct 22 townhomes. Plans were distributed to the Subdivision Advisory Committee (SAC) on November 21, 2017. A SAC meeting was held on December 14, 2017. Staff comments were sent to the applicant on December 29, 2017.

419 and 421 Paper Mill Road, Parcel IDs 0805200010, 0805200011 (PR#17-11-04): Sketch plans for the annexation and rezoning of two existing single-family homes were received by the Planning and Development Department on November 21, 2017. The plan proposes annexation and rezoning from SR (Suburban Reserve) New Castle County zoning to RH (One Family

Detached Residential) City of Newark zoning, in conjunction with the adjacent proposed subdivision of 0 Paper Mill Road, to tie into the public water and sanitary sewer. Submission of plans for 419 and 421 Paper Mill Road will likely be contingent on approval of the 0 Paper Mill Road subdivision, as the plan proposes the discharge of sewage using the 0 Paper Mill Road infrastructure. Plans were distributed to the Subdivision Advisory Committee on November 21, 2017.

1501 Casho Mill Road, Parcel ID 1803000127 (PR#17-11-05): On November 23, 2017, the Planning and Development Department received a sketch plan submission for a Comprehensive Development Plan amendment and major subdivision for the property located at 1501 Cash Mill Road. The proposal includes demolition of the existing office building at the site and construction of a new three-story structure with 23,526 square feet of office and retail on the first floor and 60 apartments on the second and third floors. Plans were distributed to the Subdivision Advisory Committee on November 29, 2017. A SAC meeting was held on December 18, 2017. Staff comments were sent to the applicant on January 18, 2018.

924 Barksdale Road, Parcel ID 1802400155 (PR#17-11-06): A sketch plan for the rezoning and major subdivision of 924 Barksdale Road was received by the Planning and Development Department on November 30, 2017. The plan proposes rezoning the property from BL (Limited Business) to AC (Adult Community) zoning to construct a 112-unit assisted living and memory care facility. On May 9, 2018, the Planning and Development Department received an application and revised plans for a Comprehensive Development Plan amendment, rezoning, and major subdivision at 924 Barksdale Road. The sketch plan was distributed to the Subdivision Advisory Committee (SAC) on December 1, 2017. Staff comments were sent to the applicant on February 15, 2018. Revised plans were distributed for SAC review on May 9, 2018. A SAC meeting was held on May 23, 2018 to discuss the plans with City operating departments. A SAC letter with staff comments was sent to the applicant on June 12, 2018.

3 and 5 Bridlebrook Lane, Parcel IDs 0900730033, 0900730034 (PR#18-01-01): On January 18, 2018, the Planning and Development Department received plans for the annexation and rezoning of 3 Bridlebrook Lane in Covered Bridge Farms to connect to the City of Newark sanitary sewer utility. No other development is proposed as part of this plan. On February 23, 2018, plans were received for the annexation and rezoning of 5 Bridlebrook Lane. The applicants request annexation and rezoning to connect to City of Newark sanitary sewer. This request is being combined with the annexation and rezoning request for 3 Bridlebrook Lane that was received on January 18, 2018. Plans for 3 Bridlebrook Lane were distributed to the Subdivision Advisory Committee and to the Delaware Office of State Planning Coordination for the PLUS review on January 24, 2018. The PLUS review for 3 Bridlebrook Lane has been scheduled for February 28, 2018. Plans for 5 Bridlebrook Lane were forwarded to the Subdivision Advisory Committee and to the Delaware Office of State Planning Coordination for PLUS review on February 23, 2018. At their meeting on April 3, 2018, the Planning Commission recommended approval of the annexation and rezoning of 3 Bridlebrook Lane and 5 Bridlebrook Lane. At their meeting on May 1, 2018, the Planning Commission recommended approval of an amendment to the annexation map and planning area map in Comprehensive Development Plan V to include 3 and 5 Bridlebrook Lane. The annexation, rezoning, and amendment to the annexation/planning area maps has been scheduled for the City Council agenda on May 14, 2018 (first reading) and June 11, 2018 (second reading). The second reading for 3 and 5 Bridlebrook Lane annexation and rezoning has been postponed at the request of the applicant.

515 Capitol Trail, Charlotte's Way, Parcel IDs 1801000004, 1801000005 (PR#18-02-01): The Planning and Development Department received a sketch plan for the rezoning and major subdivision of 515 Capitol Trail, to be known as Charlotte's Way, on February 15, 2018. The plan proposes demolition of the existing buildings on the site and construction of a high-rise apartment with 24 units – 12 three-bedroom and 12 two-bedroom apartments – with 22 garage parking spaces on the first floor. Plans were distributed to the Subdivision Advisory Committee (SAC) for review on May 11, 2018. A SAC meeting was held on June 14, 2018. SAC comments were sent to the applicant on July 26, 2018.

62 North Chapel Street, Parcel ID 1801400215 (PR#18-05-03): Plans for the rezoning and major subdivision with site plan approval of 62 North Chapel Street were received by the Planning and Development Department on May 10, 2018. The plan proposes the demolition of the existing office building on the site and construction of a mixed-use building with 300 square feet of office space and 30 garage parking spaces on the first floor, and 18 two-bedroom apartments on the two floors above. Observations and Information Obtained:

The State of Delaware's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Program implemented by the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control's Surface Water Discharges Section (SWDS) features two types of inspections: one is a comprehensive inspection, referred to as an "audit" by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and the other is a focused inspection. This is a focused inspection intended to evaluate the City of Newark's public education/outreach and public participation/involvement programs.

I reviewed the permit files in order to determine the metrics that the permittee is required to meet. The current permit was issued in 2003. Although the files contain applications and other documents dated in 2010, indicating that a revised permit was expected that year, a new permit was never issued. Therefore, the 2003 permit has been administratively continued and remains in effect.

Although Newark and the University of Delaware work together to fulfill permit requirements, the 2003 permit was issued solely to Newark. The University is not a permitted entity. However, Part II of the permit states that implementation of the Storm Water Management Program (SWMP) may be achieved through participation by other entities.

Part II of the permit also states that the SWMP shall include the six minimum control measures (MCMs) and for each MCM, the permittee shall:

- Identify the measures, controls or best management practices (BMPs) to be employed.
- Identify measurable goals (narrative or numeric standards) to be used to assess and gauge the effectiveness of each measure, including timelines and milestones.
- Identify the person or entity responsible for each measure.

All elements of the SWMP are to be fully implemented by the expiration date of the permit (which was in 2008).

Part II, A.1 and 2 of the permit specifically address public education and participation, respectively. Under public education and outreach, the permittee is required to:

- Provide information concerning the impact of stormwater discharges on water quality, and specifically address steps or activities that can be taken to reduce pollutants in runoff. (See next section for specifics)
- Include the BMPs and pollution prevention (P2) efforts at City facilities, residential activities, illegal dumping into storm drains and proper disposal of litter, pet waste, household hazardous waste (HHHW), proper use and disposal of fertilizer and pesticides and impact of impervious surface on neighboring water bodies. (See next section for specifics)
- Program must be coordinated with local groups and other state and local government officials. (See next section for specifics)
- Materials may include anything that is appropriate for the target audience, such as permittee's website, pamphlets, fact sheets, brochures, public service announcements, educational displays informational meetings, storm drain markers, newsletters, and newspaper advertisements. (See next section for specifics)

Under public involvement and participation, the permittee is required to provide opportunities for the public to participate in the development, implementation and review of its SWMP. (See next section for specifics)

Under Part IV, the permittee is required to periodically (at least annually) review its SWMP and assess its effectiveness in meeting the goals and requirements in the permit. This assessment must include:

- Review status of developing or implementing each of the SWMP's MCMs.
- Assess appropriateness and effectiveness of the selected measures controls and BMPs outlined in the SWMP.
- Review of any information, such as monitoring data.
- Assess the need to modify the SWMP to reduce discharges to the MEP.
- Assess the need to modify the SWMP to meet surface water quality standards and protect designated uses.

The permittee developed a process for rating the effectiveness of its public outreach/education and involvement/participation efforts. The initial procedure was to maintain metrics on numbers of events and numbers of participants, but they decided to research alternative methods for gauging effectiveness. They ultimately decided to adopt a procedure from the California Stormwater Quality Association (CASQA - https://www.casqa.org/) that allows for a graduated, numerical assessment of effectiveness. This method is reflected in Newark's MS4 Annual Report under the heading "CASQA Outcome." The permittee's initial evaluation methodology would have met the requirements of the permit. The procedure they have identified and implemented is not only compliant; it is exemplary.

Most modifications to the SWMP may be made with written notification to the Department, but those replacing an ineffective BMP must be supported by an analysis as to why the BMP failed and why the alternative being proposed is expected to achieve the goals of the BMP.

• The permittee includes the assessment of its methods and BMPs in its annual report, including any changes. In the 2017 annual report, those changes consist only of added programs for 2019.



The annual report is due by the anniversary date of the issuance of the permit, which was June 16th.

- Newark submitted their annual report in April, well in advance of the reporting deadline. Does the program address the following items?
 - Information concerning the impact of SW discharges on water quality
 - Yes, e.g., Newark Reservoir Drinking Water Process sign, which explains that the cleaner people keep stormwater, the cleaner the drinking water is (see Annual Report attachments)
 - Steps/activities that can be taken to reduce the pollution in runoff
 - Yes, multiple publications, such as a pamphlet series the permittee produced themselves, including one on small construction sites that prescribes ways to avoid polluting runoff
 - Activities at city facilities
 - o Yes, the permittee conducted training for maintenance workers on May 4, 2017
 - BMPs and P2
 - Yes, e.g., University of Delaware (UD) supports a sustainability program for its residence halls through a "Green Committee." The Green Committee "encourages students to participate in hands-on sustainable practices while living on campus...." Since the students comprise a significant portion of Newark's population during the majority of days in the year, these committees can have a considerable impact on the water quality in the city
 - Residential activities
 - Yes, e.g., Newark Community Days includes distribution of brochures on rain barrels, swimming pools, motor oil, and more
 - Illegal dumping in the storm drains
 - o Yes
 - Proper disposal of litter, pet waste, used oil, HHHW, fertilizer and pesticides, and their impact on neighboring water bodies
 - O Yes, see brochures in annual report, which cover all of these topics
 - Including coordination with local groups, and other local government officials
 - o Yes
 - Identifying measures, controls, BMPs to be employed, measurable goals, including timelines and milestones and persons responsible for implementation
 - Yes, see annual report, which addresses measures, BMPs, measurable goals, timelines and responsibilities
 - Are the materials
 - Pamphlets

All of these types of information dissemination were used. I personally saw all of
these or evidence of the activities except for newspaper ads, which may not be as
effective as the some of the other methods the permittee employed, such as social
media.

Inspection Conclusions/Summary:

I inspected the City of Newark's Public Education and Outreach and Public Involvement and Participation MS4 programs, including reading their annual report for 2017, and meeting with the permittee onsite to observe examples of materials they have generated and distributed. The permittee has generated numerous publications, using printed media, workshops, public service announcements, advisory committees, social media, events and other methods to reach out to and educate the public, covering all the topics required by the permit. They have developed materials for the general population as well as specific, targeted audiences such as university students. The City and the University of Delaware have coordinated closely and effectively in the development and implementation of a very effective public education and participation program. They have attended and conducted trainings jointly and have gone beyond mere compliance in a number of ways. For example, the City researched and identified evaluation and assessment techniques for rating the effectiveness of their outreach program that are beyond what was required in the permit and which they use to determine how well they are progressing toward measureable goals. In addition, the City and the University have led a consortium of MS4s and potential MS4s, acting as a mentor to other entities that struggle to summon the resources necessary to field a strong MS4 program. They have generously shared their materials and expertise, which has magnified the positive effect they have had on the water resources of the State. Their efforts are appreciated and serve as a model for MS4s in Delaware.
