

### BLUE HEN BOUNTY: ST. THOMAS EPISCOPAL CHURCH

St. Thomas Episcopal Church will receive revenue-sharing funding for the first time in 2025. The church operates the Blue Hen Pantry, which serves University of Delaware staff and students. The program is entirely supported by grants and volunteer efforts. Each day, the pantry assists 2 to 10 students.

The funds provided will be used to purchase food, hygiene products, and feminine hygiene products for the pantry. Saturday, February 1, 10 a.m. - 1 p.m.


