#### **Public Works and Water Resources**

- 1. Kirkwood Highway Water Main Replacement Weekend Work \*Updated Schedule\*: The schedule has been pushed back by 2 weeks due to weather. The 4/11 work is now scheduled for this weekend (4/25). The completion date is also pushed back by 2 weeks. The Newark Post has also run an article regarding this work resulting in better notifications for the affected residents/businesses. The attached email explains the work that is slated for the Kirkwood Highway and Possum Park Road intersection over the next few weekends. As mentioned in previous reports, this work will be 24/7 from Friday PM to Monday AM with delays expected and some lane closures needed. Detours will be in place for all closures. Please reach out to Public Works if you have additional questions.
- 2. UD Building X Certificate of Occupancy: Building X project team is working to secure the final Certificate of Occupancy. The final item is road restoration along Academy Street. Since the City has an upcoming project to pave the entire section of Academy Street, we are working with UD to provide funding for our project in lieu of doing a small patch before we do the bigger project. This is a great example of how our project teams work together to complete projects efficiently.
- 3. Refuse Cart Leases: The Refuse team has been working to identify properties that are using additional refuse carts on a regular basis without paying for the additional service. Properties are posted with notice to contact Public Works regarding the additional carts. If payment is not received in a reasonable timeframe, the cart is removed from the property. This has resulted in several new cart leases and removal of several dozen carts that were not being paid for. This effort is a result of ongoing discussions to make sure the refuse service is efficient and cost effective.
- **4. GIS Team at Mid-Atlantic Water User Group Meeting:** Our Public Works GIS team attended a Water User Group Meeting in Malvern, PA this past week. This meeting brought together Water GIS

professionals from all over the Mid-Atlantic to showcase new and developing ways to utilize GIS in our everyday operations and asset management. The focus groups cut out the fluff and only deal with tasks and issues around water, wastewater, and stormwater by people who specialize in these areas.

#### **Planning and Development**

#### 1. Land Use

- a. Land Use staff attended the virtual National Planning Conference April 23-25. This is a cost-effective way to allow planners to get the continuing education credits and/or education sessions needed to take the AICP exam.
- b. Staff finalized the May 6 Planning Commission agenda for newspaper publication. The Comprehensive Development Plan amendment and major subdivision by site plan approval for 118, 120, 126 and 129 Lovett Avenue and proposed amendments to Chapter 32, Zoning, to establish regulations for Electronic Variable Messaging Signs and for signs in the Parkland zoning district are both scheduled for that agenda.
- c. Staff received a <u>resubdivision plan for 0 Milford Run</u>, which would construct 10 single-family detached houses and 4 single-family semidetached houses for a total of 14 units on April 11<sup>th</sup>.

#### 2. Code Enforcement

- a. Staff spent time working with consultants regarding questions on the scopes of work for both the rental and business license audit and the comprehensive fee review which are due on April 25. Staff expect two proposals on the rental and business license audit and three proposals for the comprehensive fee review. The goal is to notify the successful firms in early May.
- b. The North Twin Lakes townhouse-style apartments have begun receiving their temporary certificates of occupancy for the 24 units in that development.
- c. 101 Discovery Boulevard, which is a seven-story, 229-unit apartment building on STAR Campus, has had its building permit approved.
- d. Construction has begun for the 54-unit apartment building at 532 Old Barksdale Road.
- e. Sprinkler permits for Fountainview buildings 1000, 2000, and 3000 have been approved for the proposed repairs.
- f. Berry Sweet Café at 1007 South College Avenue received their certificate of completion.
- g. Ugly Dumpling at 140 East Main Street received their certificate of completion.

### 3. Parking

- Parking ambassadors have been field testing the new body worn cameras for the division.
   Several interviews were conducted this week for news organizations interested in the project.
- b. The replacement bi-directional sensors for the Lot #1 parking countdown sign have been delivered. The vendor is scheduled to install them on April 25.

### Facilities, Records, and Purchasing

- Sallyport Repairs: The NPD Sallyport Slab Replacement bid opportunity will be distributed today— April 25th. The opportunity can be found at www.newarkde.gov/bids. The bid opening will be May 27th with construction likely to begin in late June or early July. The project is expected to last 120 days.
- 2. **ESCO 1 Project Update:** The energy savings performance contract with Seiberlich Trane Energy Services (ESCO 1) was officially closed out the week of 4/14. An overview of the savings generated from this contract are outlined in the City's Sustainability Plan Update, which will come before

Council for adoption shortly.

- 3. **ESCO 2 Project Update:** The final PO for the additional \$2+ million contract with Seiberlich Trane (ESCO 2) was issued the week of 4/21. All project items are estimated to be completed by June 30th.
- **4. Warehouse Expansion:** The foundation for the electric warehouse expansion at the Field Operations Complex is complete and installation of the building itself will begin next week.

### Finance and IT

- Audit Staff continues to work on the final fieldwork stage of the City's annual financial statement audit. Completion of Annual Comprehensive Financial Report by deadline of June 30, 2025 is on track.
- **2. Part Time Bookkeeper Vacancy** Resumes are currently being reviewed, and interviews are anticipated to begin in early May.

#### **Electric**

### 1. Field Operations:

- a. The line crews have been working at the Newark Housing Authority reconfiguring and removing primary and secondary circuits for project demolition that is being done in stages.
- b. The 34kV bushings on a substation transformer were replaced last week. The unit was energized and the circuits were switched back to normal.
- c. The electricians have been installing pole mounted cameras for the police and IT departments. The electricians also worked on communication issues at the Sandy Brae Substation.
- Engineering: Engineering has been working with SCADA vendors implementing the Outage
   Management System. Engineering also programmed a new 12kV recloser and added it to the SCADA system.

### **Parks and Recreation**

### 1. Capital Projects:

- Dickey Park improvement progress meetings held monthly (approximately 75% project completion), paving has begun and the pavilion will be installed tentatively mid-May barring any weather delays
- George Read Park improvements first progress meeting held, mark out for the trail and work for the basketball court has begun, paving will likely begin in May barring any weather delays
- Old Papermill Road Park first progress meeting held, working on curbing around the parking area
- d. Olan Thomas/Kershaw Trail scheduled DelDOT public meeting for June 5 at City Hall.
- e. Folk Park potential project- survey sent out through Inform Me to over 6,445 people, received 155 responses, Wills Group has reviewed the responses and is putting together some plan options to proceed with based on the feedback, compilation of results will be sent to Council for decision/direction.

### 2. Maintenance/Operations:

- a. Mowing has started on a cycle in the parks and horticulture areas
- b. Tree giveaway trees will be arriving May 7 in preparation for the event.

- c. Eight park inspections completed along with tree inspections at various locations.
- d. Still waiting on response from the property owner for the removal of 3 trees from 262 S. College after Council approved landscape waiver. Owner has proposed a new third option.
- e. Weed War scheduled for April 26 with over 30 volunteers registered
- f. Arbor Day event held at Fairfield Park with 5 tree contractors supporting the event
- g. Working on setting up tree inventory details within GIS.
- h. Met with DelDOT representatives on site for another meeting regarding Elkton Road landscaping plans
- Met with Pennoni representatives and Jeff Martindale to discuss the future storage facility at the maintenance yard

#### 3. Events:

- a. April 12 Annual Egg Hunt was held indoors at Newark High School and was very successful.
- b. April 12 Spring Community Clean Up was held in the light rain, some groups did not show up that pre-registered, 100 volunteers did participate
- c. Spring Tree Giveaway May 10, information has been sent out to Constant Contact mailing list, social media and City Council, registration began April 21.
- d. Memorial Day Parade May 18, 1:30 p.m. ceremony and parade at 2 p.m., invitation letter was sent to over 180 contacts, groups are continuing to sign up slowly, VIP letter will be sent out the end of April and another push for more groups to sign up

### 4. Recreation Programming:

- a. Summer program brochure is being finalized and will be available 4/28 for residents and 5/2 for non-residents
- b. Camp REAL mailing was sent out to neighbors surrounding Dickey Park and Alder Creek. Continuing to promote, registration is low. Camp dates are June 16 Aug. 8, two 4 -week sessions from 9 a.m. 12 p.m. at Dickey Park.
- c. Spring Break Camps were held April 21 25 including the traditional full day camp at GWC, Basketball Camp at Newark High and Volleyball Camp at Downes Elementary
- d. George Wilson Center
  - i. For the past week, we had 7 long term rental events, 5 short term rentals, and the usual classes of yoga, goju, theater, pickleball and dance.
  - ii. Preparing for upcoming dance class recital scheduled for May 10

### 5. Volunteers:

- a. Saturday History Stroll (4/12/25): The stroll went well considering the weather. They went to all locations scheduled for the stroll except for one due to it being a "soggy mess". 20 people attended. The City of Newark has many "Hidden Gems" but the UD Museums are right in the heart of the city! The three museums at the University of Delaware host an abundance of history, art, and culture. The Newark Police Department is proud to honor these individuals for their exceptional commitment and service to the community, with special thanks to all who attended, especially our Newark Police Chaplains, and to

Historic Register. The building dates back to 1834 and has a large main gallery and a small, intimate space for smaller exhibits. Old College typically hosts 2 - 4 exhibits per year. Many of the exhibitions come from the Special Collections and Museums at the University of Delaware. Currently, the exhibit featuring the "Colors of Old College," includes items from the Newark History Museum. This exhibition is available through May 15, 2025.

The second museum, Mechanical Hall, is just around the corner from Old College. The building dates back to 1898 and is also on the National Register of Historical Places. Mechanical Hall used to house part of the Engineering Department, the athletic training center, it was used as a residence for GIs after WW II, and the campus center for the ROTC program. After being renovated in 2004, the building reopened as the home of the Paul R. Jones Collection of African American Art. Jones gifted several hundred pieces from his personal collection and is considered to be the most comprehensive collection of 18th, 19th, and 20th century African American art.

The current exhibition at Mechanical Hall is called MINE - What is Ours in the Wake of Extraction. This exhibition centers around the elimination of indigenous lands and cultures in the Amazon devastated by an illegal gold mining boom. Visitors will learn about the Harakbut culture through the Etochime Artist Collective. This exhibition also features mineral specimens from the region that contribute to the issues affecting the region.

On April 23, 2025, a unique event pertaining to the MINE exhibition will take place. The Mechanical Hall will host a Gallery Talk, while the Trabant Theatre will host a Film Festival including Rainforest chocolate and coffee. Penny Hall is the home of the third museum, the Mineralogical Museum. This museum opened in 1971 and went through a major renovation in 2009. The founding gift for this collection of minerals was given by Irènee du Pont in 1964, whose own collection dated to the 1920s. The collection now contains 3,000 specimens of minerals, meteorites, gems, and carvings.

All three museums are open to the public and are free. Hours are 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. and these museums are open when students are in session. If you would like more information on the hidden gems, of Newark, please go to https://library.udel.edu/special/.

# FOOD BANK OF DELAWARE: MOBILE PANTRY PROGRAM

The Food Bank of Delaware has received funds through the Revenue Sharing Program to host four Mobile Food Pantry distribution events in underserved communities in the City of Newark. The Mobile Food Pantry provides both shelf-stable and fresh foods to low-income Delawareans. The truck arrives stocked with dairy, fresh produce, non-perishables, frozen meals, and other refrigerated items.

Each event will provide food assistance for up to 75 households in need, with each household receiving up to 75 pounds of food and other essential items. Assistance includes produce, dairy, proteins, shelf-stable food items, household supplies, and hygiene products.

### Good afternoon All,

I am reaching out to provide some information pertaining to the planned City of Newark water main replacement project along Capital Trail (SR2). The general work extents are between Possum Park Road and Ridge Avenue. Some of you may have seen the barrels, cones, and equipment staged along the corridor and I know some of you have already received inquiries from your constituents about the work. We wanted to provide some additional information and make sure you have a good point of contact should you receive any concerns/questions regarding the project as we getting moving.

The existing water main along this stretch Capital Trail is beyond its recommended useful life and has been prone to leaks and breaks over the past several years. This project will replace approximately 1,000 linear feet of water main on the westbound side of Capital Trail between Morning Sod & Supply and Ridge Avenue. The main will be installed in the westbound left travel lane and most of the work will be completed under single lane closures with periodic closures of the adjacent left turn lanes to allow for staging and facilitate the main installation. There will be one full weekend closure and detour of southbound Possum Park Road when we cross the Possum Park and Capital Trail intersection with the new main. The City has been working with DelDOT Traffic Section and Public Works to coordinate closures and road restoration requirements. All work is scheduled to be completed over weekends, beginning on Friday nights and ending Monday mornings at 5am or sooner. There will be three crews work separate shifts to complete the work as quickly as possible. The work is anticipated to take 6-8 weeks assuming mother nature cooperates, which is not likely to be the case given the time of year, so we realistically expect the work to take us into the early summer before final restoration is completed.

We have been coordinating with nearby businesses and will be issuing a formal notice this afternoon so they are fully aware the project is coming and can reach out to the City for updates should they need to. We have also been in contact with St. John/Holy Angels Parish and have shifted working hours to avoid Palm Sunday and Easter holidays. An example notice is attached for your reference. See anticipated schedule for the next 6 weeks below and please do not hesitate to contact us should you have any questions/concerns.

# **Water Main Installation Notice for Liberty Plaza**

The City of Newark, Public Works and Water Resources Department will be replacing our water main along Capitol Trail (Kirkwood Highway) between Possum Park Road and Ridge Avenue beginning Friday, April 11<sup>th</sup> 2025. This work includes installing water main through the intersection of Possum Park Road and Capitol Trail. This work will temporarily impact traffic on Capitol Trail, Possum Park Road, and access to Liberty Plaza/Possum Park Mall. The installation will be completed over the next 6 – 8 weeks (weather dependent). There are two phases of the project that will impact the western entrance to the shopping center. A detailed summary of these phases and their impacts to the center are provided below (See reverse side for exhibit that delineates the work areas):

# Phase 1 – April 25<sup>th</sup> to April 28<sup>th</sup> – Possum Park Road Closure

- O Work will take place in the westbound left lane of Capitol Trail, through the intersection of Possum Park Road and Capitol Trail. Possum Park Road will be closed to southbound traffic, resulting in no access to Liberty Plaza from Possum Park Road. The westbound left turn lane into the plaza will be closed as well. During this time, the main entrance to the plaza will be limited to traffic traveling eastbound on Capitol Trail, with only right turns into and out of the plaza. There will be no impact to the eastern entrance and exit.
- Work will begin at 8pm on Friday, April 25<sup>th</sup> and be completed by 5am on Monday, April 28<sup>th</sup>.

# Phase 2 – May 2<sup>nd</sup> to May 5<sup>th</sup>

- The water main installation will resume in the westbound left lane of Capitol Trail, moving in an easternly direction. This will result in a closure of the westbound left turn lane into the plaza. Traffic traveling south on Possum Park Road will not be affected in this phase. There will be no impact to the eastern entrance and exit.
- Work will begin at 8pm on Friday, May 2<sup>nd</sup> and be completed by 5am on Monday, May 5<sup>th</sup>.

We do not anticipate any water service disruptions for the shopping center during the water main installation. This work schedule is subject to change based on weather conditions and any other unforeseen circumstances. The department will provide notification of any changes.
