Sec. 2-89. - General powers and duties of the planning commission.

(a) Recommendations and advisements on planning subjects.

advise the city council on zoning and land subdivision matters as provided in the respective ordinances; on the comprehensive development plan; on the official map of the city; on proposed ordinances concerning land use and land development regulations; on urban renewal; on expenditures for capital improvements, where such improvements refer to a matter covered by the comprehensive plan or the official map and on

such other planning subjects as are referred to it by the city council or the city manager.

All such recommendations and advisements by the planning commission shall be submitted to the council within a time specified by the council and prior to the public hearing by the council on the proposed ordinance, where applicable.

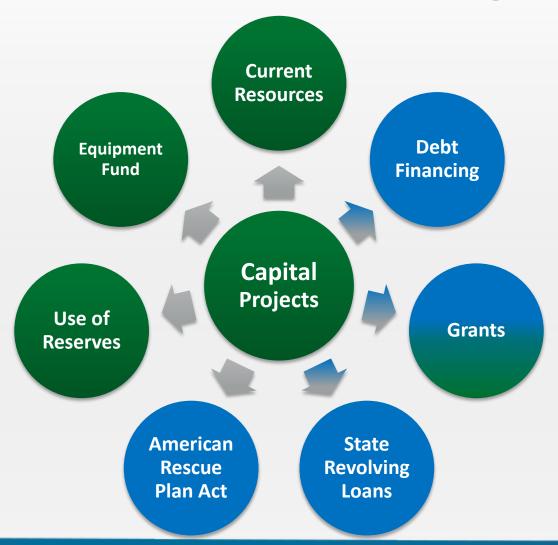

Planning & Development Key Accomplishments – 2022

BB-RA Zoning Code Review and Community Charrette

- Conducted a five-day charrette in March 2022 to get community input on changes that residents and stakeholders want to see in the downtown area.
- Multiple rounds of review with Council culminating in a joint Planning Commission and Council meeting on August 25.
- Final code language is to be reviewed by Planning Commission this evening before being considered by Council.

Parking Subcommittee

- Downtown Newark Parking Plan Phases I and II presented to Council in March 2022.
- Parking Advisory Committee established, on street parking time limit reduced, Residential Parking Permit zone process codified, and supervising department codified by Council in July 2022.
- BB parking changes reviewed by Planning Commission in July, which will go to Council in conjunction with the other BB-RA
 updates.
- Parking lot design requirement recommendations currently are being reviewed by staff to bring to Planning Commission by the end of the year.
- Parking fine updates are going to Council in November and parking rate updates are being discussed as part of the FY2023 budget process.



Planning & Development Accomplishments (cont'd)

Transportation Improvement District

- Steering Committee met throughout 2022 and forwarded their final recommended TID and fee schedule on September 14, 2022.
- A joint Planning Commission and Council meeting to review the recommendation is scheduled for November 3, 2022.

Five Year Review of the Comprehensive Plan

Project completed with the final adoption of Comprehensive Development Plan V 2.0 on August 8, 2022 by Council.

Rental Housing Workgroup

- Initial policy item regarding accessory dwelling units was shelved by Council in May 2022 with remaining items paused based on Council direction.
- Workgroup recommendations to be included in a larger "a-third-able housing" policy initiative to be put together in 2023.

Nuisance Property Ordinance

• Two smaller interim ordinances adopted by Council in February and July 2022. Full nuisance property ordinance to go to Council in November 2022.

Chapter 17 Property Maintenance Code Updates

• Staff currently reviewing Chapter 17 to update to the 2021 International Property Maintenance Code and to update rental permit formula to reflect City costs and time to inspect dwelling units.



Electric Key Accomplishments – 2022

- The City of Newark Electric Department received the <u>American Public Power Association's</u> (APPA) Safety Award of Excellence for safe operating practices in 2021. The Department won first place in Group C, which has 30,000 to 59,999 worker-hours of exposure and was recognized at the APPA Engineering and Operations Conference today. 318 utilities from across the country entered the annual Safety Awards. Entrants were placed in categories according to their number of worker-hours and ranked based on the most incident-free records during 2021. The incident rate, which is used to judge entries, is based on its number of work-related reportable injuries or illnesses and the number of worker-hours during 2021 as defined by the occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).
- The City of Newark Electric Department has received **national recognition for achieving exceptional electric reliability** in 2021. The recognition comes from the American Public Power Association (APPA), a trade group that represents more than 2,000 not-for-profit, community-owned electric utilities. APPA helps electric utilities track power outage and restoration data through its subscription-based eReliability Tracker service. Once per year, APPA's Reliability Team compares this data to national statistics tracked by the U.S. Energy Information Administration for all types of electric utilities.
- Circuit Breaker Replacement. The new 35kV circuit breaker at the Fremont Road substation will be installed. The new circuit breaker will replace the 45 years old 35kV oil circuit breaker. We are also upgrading the communication hardware at this substation so that we can transfer this substation to the new SCADA system. The project is in progress, and we are on track to complete this project by the end of 2023.



Electric Key Accomplishments – 2022 (cont'd)

- Successfully moved South Chapel substation from the old Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system to the new SCADA system.
 We will transfer the other eight substations to the new SCADA system in 2023.
- Implementation of Outage Management System (OMS). With this application, we will be able to efficiently track outages, reduce downtime, and proactively and safely guide field crews during restoration activities. The application comes with a customer outage portal. With this portal, customers will be able to access real-time status updates detailing the estimated time of restoration, scheduled outages, and other outage-related activities. The project is in progress, and we are on track to complete it by the end of the first quarter of 2023.
- CIP E1807 Relay replacements at Kershaw Substation This project's scope includes replacing the existing 138/34 kV T4 transformer and 139kV circuit breaker electromechanical relays with new digital microprocessor relays at Kershaw Substation. We have completed 90% of the engineering drawings for 138/34 kV transformer T4. The project is in progress. This is a multi-year project. All the engineering work will be completed by the first quarter of 2023.
- Development Projects. We have completed the following development projects throughout the City:
 - The Grove (87 new meters were installed for apartment building 1)
 - Newark Senior Center on Barksdale Rd
 - 279 Orchard Road
 - 511 Valley Road
 - Newark Charter School
 - Fintech at STAR Campus



Parks & Recreation Key Accomplishments - 2022

- Developed a preliminary design for Old Paper Mill Road Park that includes a multipurpose grass field, pickleball courts and pavilion area.
- Completed the installation of the new park signage throughout the park system.
- Completed repairs and resurfacing of the Fairfield and Phillips Park tennis courts and the White Chapel basketball court.
- Completed tree giveaway of 240 trees to Newark residents with financial support from the Conservation Advisory Commission (CAC).
- Received grant funding from the Delmarva Sustainability Grant Program to plant over 900 trees throughout the park system. Had over 100 volunteers assisting with the plantings at 5 different sites.
- Installation of a new kiln at the George Wilson Center replacing the old kiln that was over 30 years old.
- Received grant money from the Childcare Stabilization grant for the Before and After School Care programs which assisted with personnel costs and outdoor classrooms for both sites.
- Happy to report that we have been able to resume with Community Events including the Egg Hunt, Memorial
 Day Parade, July 4th Fireworks, Community Day, etc. after a two-year hiatus due to COVID-19.



PWWR Key Accomplishments - 2022

Sewer Utility:

- Completed the lining of approximately 10,000 linear feet of degraded sewer line, increasing the life span by 50+ years.
- Continued to clean and inspect locations throughout the City in order to program additional rehabilitation programs in future years.

Water Utility:

- Completed a \$2 million water main replacement program to address deteriorated pipes, water quality concerns, and pressure and flow improvements. Locations include Chrysler Ave, East Park Place, and Dallam Road.
- Completed 2/3 of the water valve maintenance program, with completion slated for Spring 2023.
- Completed design and construction on a chlorine booster station at New London Tank.
- Negotiated a new lease for cell tower antennae at our New London Tank.

Fleet Maintenance

 Maintained safe operation of fleet on the road despite challenges with cost and availability of parts. Similar challenges with the availability of new vehicles to replace aging vehicles compounded these issues.



PWWR Key Accomplishments – 2022 (cont'd)

GIS Development

Fire Flow Testing, Water Main Break, and sidewalk inspection apps. (See GIS Accomplishments – Slide
 12)

Street:

- Completed paving and rehabilitation of streets and curbs in 14 segments of street around the City, including Hillside Road and Forest Lane in conjunction with the Hillside Park project.
- Rolled out a mandatory training program for new Commercial Driver's License (CDL) applicants per new federal motor carrier rules.

Stormwater Utility:

- Rehabilitated 2 large segments (48" diameter) of Corrugated Metal Pipe and awarded contract for the replacement of another large segment to begin late 2022.
- Completed a water quality retrofit of an existing stormwater basin in Abbottsford development.
 Submerged gravel wetlands installation is effective at removing sediment and phosphorus from the runoff before discharging to the Christina River.



Information Technology Key Accomplishments - 2022

- Improved remote access system by upgrading two legacy virtual private network (VPN) solutions into a single software-based solution.
- Upgraded our backup and recovery systems and Windows Servers to a modern solution
- Designed and implemented supervisory control and data acquisition (SCADA) network improvements to bett er control city assets.
- Worked with the Electric and Police Departments to deploy new surveillance cameras.
- Upgraded Harris Northstar Customer Information System (CIS) and Compass SmartWorks, meter data management software (Nov/Dec). Harris Northstar is the system used by the City to manage our water, sewer, and electric utilities.
- Replaced Harris Customer Connect, customer utility engagement portal, with their upgraded solution Harris SilverBlaze (to be completed in December).
- Worked with Tyler Technologies and the Communications team to implement the MyCivic App, a customizable platform designed to promote civic engagement and enhance the quality of life for the citizens of Newark (to be completed in December).



GIS Key Accomplishments - 2022

- Awarded a Special Achievement in GIS award from ESRI for our work in encouraging the use of GIS to streamline daily operations throughout our departments.
- Operation Dashboards (Various Departments)— Successfully created comprehensive summary applications
 providing location-aware data visualization and analytics for a real-time operational view and the condition
 of departmental assets.
- **Fire Hydrant Flow Test Application (PWWR)** Created GIS-based application allowing field staff to perform and catalog fire flow test data and create reports for design engineers quickly and reliably.
- Stormwater Management BMP Inspection and Reporting (PWWR) Created an application to streamline the collection of field inspection data and automated reporting to the facility owner for recommended maintenance.
- Sidewalk Safety Inspection Application (PWWR) Created an application to streamline and automate the field collection of sidewalk inspections to easily create and send notification of necessary repairs to property owners.

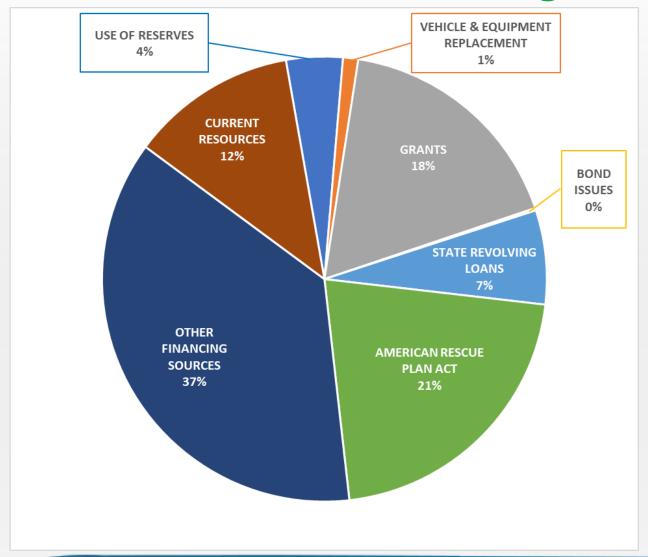

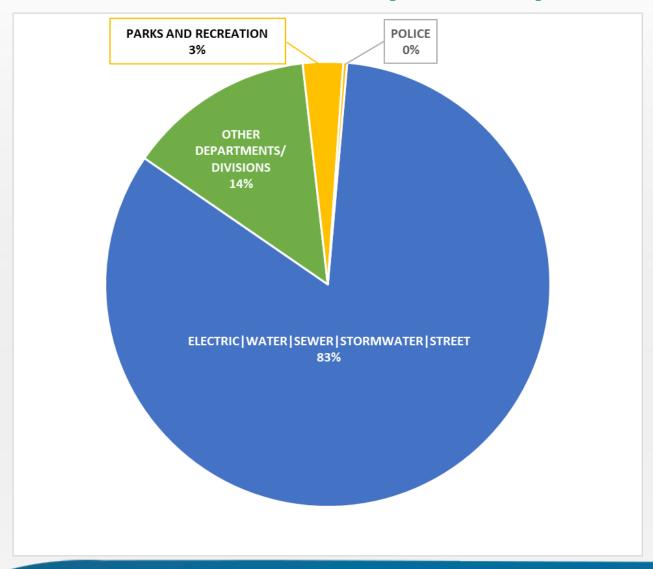
